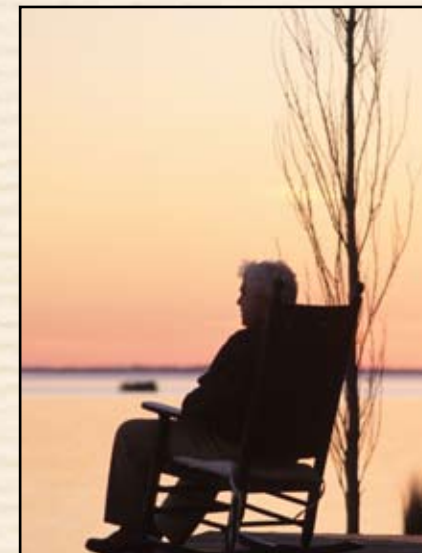

MINI FARMERS MARKET LIVELY UP FARM COMES TO CHETOLA

There is nothing better than crisp, fresh produce...unless, of course, it's organically grown at a local farm and is delivered straight to your own backyard. Thanks to Chetola Resort's Wellness Program, Chetola employees, owners and guests have the unique opportunity to purchase organic produce from the Valle Crucis-based **Lively Up Farm** in Chetola's very own "yard" — or, more precisely, in front of Timberlake's Restaurant every Thursday at 2pm from June 14 - October 25.

Many Chetola employees are taking advantage this season of farmer Matt Cooper's Community Supported Agriculture initiative by joining the CSA for a set fee and, in return, receiving a weekly supply of fresh-picked food as it ripens. The CSA generally offers significant savings from grocery retail as well as farmer's market prices. Joining a CSA is a community-minded way to help small local farms survive financially as they transition to a new growing season.

The reapings from Lively Up Farm promise to be both diverse and delicious. This growing season, Cooper has planted the following organic produce that could be available for purchase: three kinds of kale, collards, Swiss chard, three varieties of summer squash, patty pan squash, two types of zucchini, potatoes (red, white and blue), purple and green beans, garlic, onions, basil, tomatoes, cucumbers, broccoli, and butternut, acorn and spaghetti squash. ■

A FIGHT TO THE FINISH



Once again, this year promises to be an excellent fishing season at Chetola. We are excited to announce our exclusive partnership with the Mayview Rod and Gun Club. This association offers benefits to Chetola owners, including the opportunity to fish the Mayview's trophy trout water and to enjoy full-day float trips for trout and small mouth bass. We are particularly excited about the float trips, as they provide a great moment for parent-child or grandparent-grandchild bonding. Float

trips allow the same opportunity to catch trophy trout without stream wading, a request we have had in the past. A lot of folks have asked us, "Can you really catch trophy trout this side of the continental divide?" The answer is, "Absolutely, and the proof is in the many photos on display in Chetola's lobby."

Small mouth bass fishing is something we have been working on for two years, and we are pleased to finally be able to offer the chance for Chetola owners to catch a true fighting fish.
